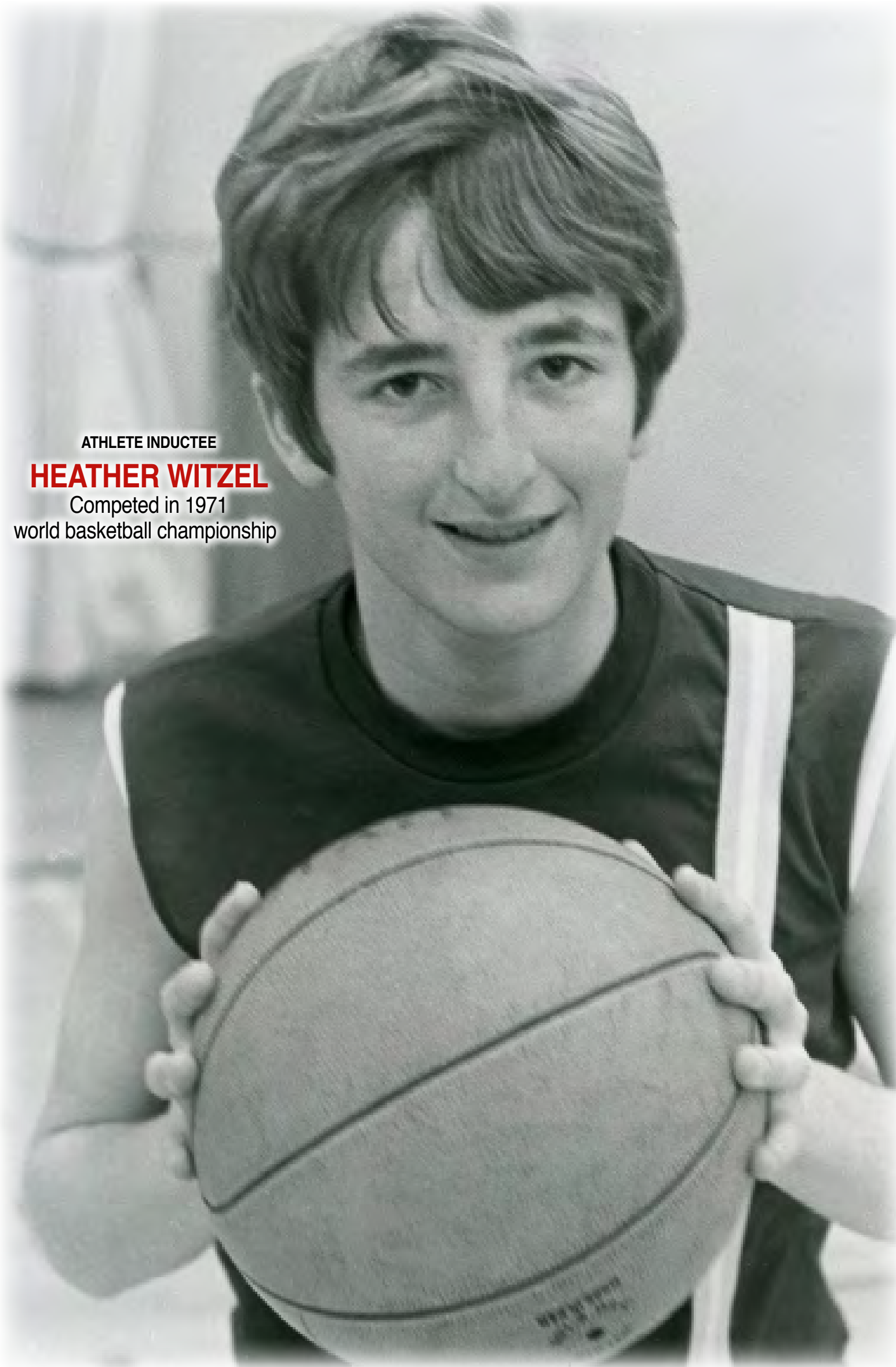

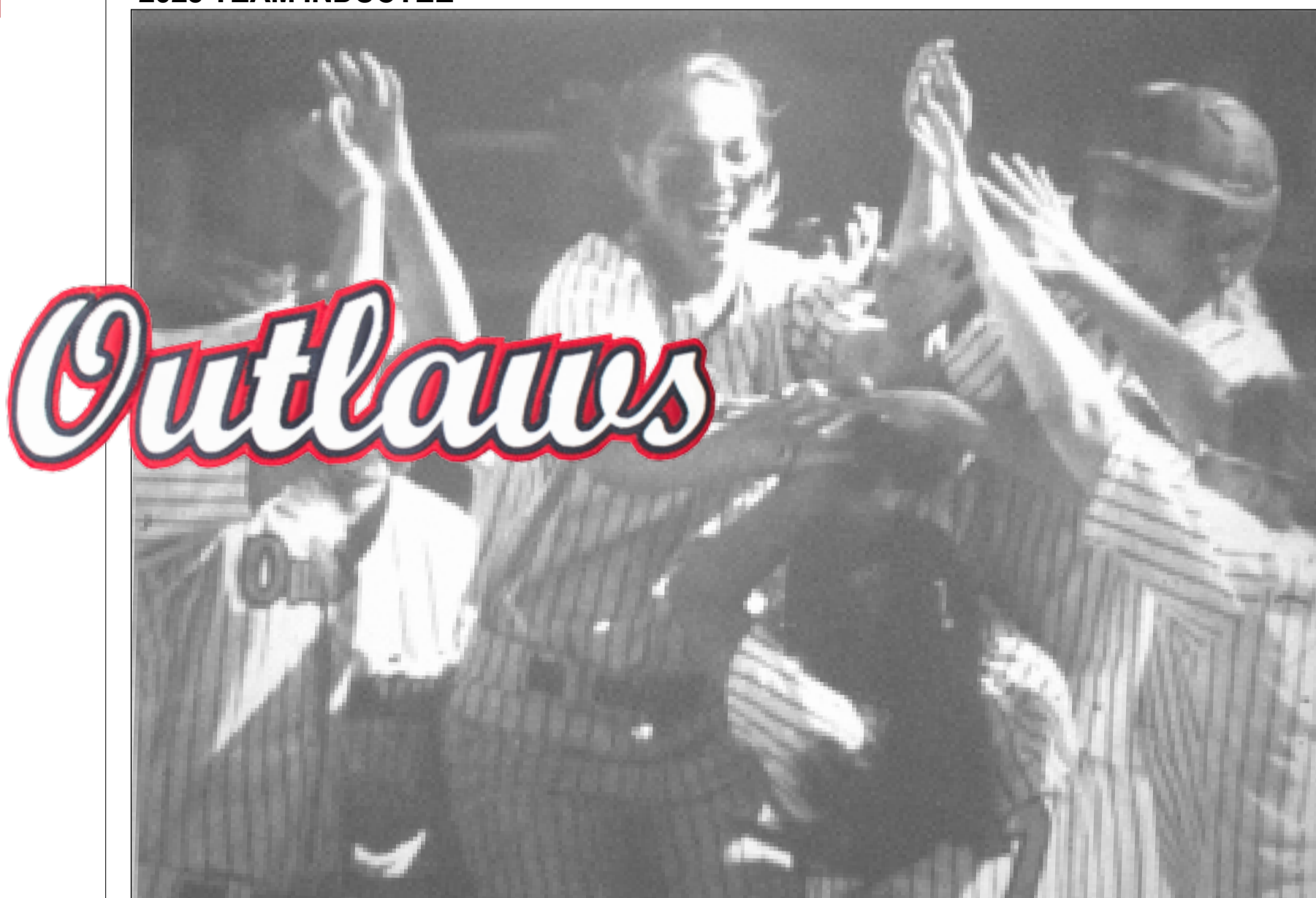

Athletics

Michael Akintunde is the first male in the history of the University of Saskatchewan Huskies track and field team to win the long jump title at the U SPORTS championships.

Akintunde jumped 7.62 metres and broke his own Huskies team record at nationals in March in the Saskatoon Field House.

Two weeks earlier, Akintunde set the Huskies record of 7.59 metres when he won the Canada West conference championship. *John Konihowski held the Huskies record of 7.46 metres for 50 years.

Akintunde, an alumnus of Saskatoon St. Joseph High School, is a third-year business student.

The Canadian university championships have been held since 1969-70. Two women from the U of S have been national university champions in long jump: *Diane Jones in 1969-70 and *Vanessa Monar in 1992-93.

Racquetball

Danielle (Drury) Ramsay of Saskatoon competed in the Pan Am racquetball championships in Guatemala City, Guatemala in April.

Ramsay was ninth in women's doubles with **Michèle Morissette** of Baie-Comeau, QC., and ninth in mixed doubles with **Coby Iwaasa** of Lethbridge, AB.

Ramsay has competed in the Canadian racquetball championships since 2014. She finished third in singles and second in doubles with Jennifer Saunders of Winnipeg, MB., last year.

Ramsay was coached by *Loren Prentice when she was a junior. Her current coach is **Tim Landeryou**.

Len Chelack of Saskatoon is the latest recipient of the *David Newsham Award from the Saskatchewan Soccer Association for outstanding volunteer contribution to the sport.

Chelack has been president of SSA, a referee, a national instructor of referees and a referee assessor

Paige Dziadyk of Saskatoon is an outside hitter for the women's volleyball team at Lakeland College in Lloydminster, AB., that won the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association national championship in March in Nanaimo, B.C.

Dziadyk, a third-year business administration student, is a graduate of Bishop Mahoney High School.

The Rustlers went 18-1 in the regular season, 3-0 in the Alberta Colleges playoffs and 3-0 in the Canadian championship.

Lakeland's **Austin Dyer** was named the CCAA women's volleyball coach of the year. Dyer was the interim head coach of the University of Saskatchewan Huskies women's team in 2009-10.

Hockey

Riley Girod of Saskatoon is a left-winger with the Battlefords North Stars, who won Canterra Seeds Cup this season as league champions in the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League.

Girod had nine goals and 27 points in the regular season. He added four points in league playoffs and the Centennial Cup national championship.

Brooks Bandits of Alberta defeated North Battleford 4-0 in the Canadian final.

Also on the North Stars from Saskatoon is defenceman **Easton Rask**.

Brayden Klimosko is the general manager and head coach of the North Stars, who had a 64-11 record in the regular season and playoffs.

Klimosko was a running back with the Saskatoon Hilltops football team in 2008 and 2009.

Passings

Don Bailey 1934-2023, age 89 Multiple sports

Circle the name Don Bailey. Don't put his name inside the circle. Write his name around it. Bailey covered everything.

As a student in Nutana Collegiate, he competed in the Saskatoon Optimist Club's oratory contest. He was Nutana's Senior Watch. Although he weighed only 140 pounds, he was a star offensive half-back on the Blues football team.

In 1951, when the Saskatchewan high school basketball final was held for the first time at University of Saskatchewan Phys Ed gym, Bailey was a guard on the Nutana team that defeated Regina Balfour Tech Redmen. The Blues, coached by ***Bob Adams**, finished the season undefeated.

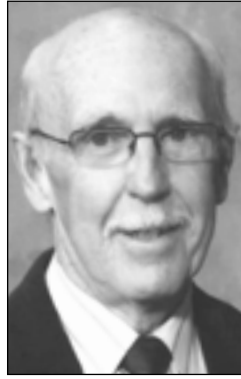
In his one season playing for the U of S Huskies, Bailey's teammates included ***Ron Walsh**, who is enshrined in the Hall as a football and track & field official, **Ray Hnatyshyn**, who went on to be the Governor General of Canada, and league all-stars **Windy Hudon**, **Dennis McCarthy**, **Doug Stark** and **Bob Upton**.

Bailey was later the president of the Saskatoon Amateur Basketball Association.

He skied. "I managed to win the Swiss 'wipe-out' championship," he said. "The winning exercise was a twisting 1 1/2 back flip in layout position, depositing along the way poles, sun glasses, safety straps and finally, as a grand climax, burying both skis eight feet into the snow."

Bailey was hired by the U of S Department of Phys Ed in 1959. He was a professor and researcher on campus until he retired in 1994. For the following 11 years, he was a visiting prof at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia.

Bailey promoted fitness for everyone. He was the longest serving member on the national board with ParticipACTION.

Terry Laughren 1949-2023, age 73 Curling

The Brier came to Saskatoon in 1989. Terry Laughren was there.

The Brier returned in 2000. Again, Terry Laughren was there. He was everywhere.

Laughren was the chair of the Canadian men's curling championship at SaskPlace in his first Brier. He was vice-president of ticket sales the next time.

He'd also served as president of the Granite Club and of Curl Saskatoon.

A native of Rosetown, Laughren started curling as a kid.

"We didn't have a hockey rink,"

Laughren said in an article in The StarPhoenix. "We had a community rink. It was about 100 yards from the school and I could spend noon hours, after-four time and after-supper time there."

Al Ledingham 1939-2023, age 84 Builder inductee: Football

Team inductee: 1958, 1959, 1968 Hilltops

Al Ledingham, a guard on offence and a linebacker on defence, was on the field from the opening kickoff until the final play when the Saskatoon Hilltops defeated the Notre Dame de Grace Maple Leafs 18-14 to win the Canadian junior football championship in Montreal. That was 1958. His influence on the game continues 65 years later.

As a coach, Ledingham watched football with an analytical mind. As a high school teacher, he sparked students' potential. In his 34 years of work in education, he taught math and science, became a high school principal and was superintendent of facilities with the Saskatoon Public School Board.

Coaching is teaching, he said. Organize. Set a goal. Believe that you can achieve.

Ledingham grew up a few blocks away from Griffiths Stadium, where the Hilltops played. He spent his weekly 25 cent allowance on admission to their games.

He played three years of high school football for City Park Collegiate Maroons, four years with the Hilltops and one year with the University of Saskatchewan Huskies, winning nationals with the Hilltops in 1958 and '59.

He was a coach with the Hilltops for eight years, one year as an assistant and seven as head coach. The Toppers won the Canadian championship in his final season with the team in 1968.

He was the head coach of the Huskies for three years. He was an assistant coach at Evan Hardy and Bedford Road Collegiates.

Ledingham went to clinics. He helped to write the Level I manual for football coaches when Canada started a National Coaching Certification Program.

"Football and school have given me a great degree of satisfaction," he said.

Bud Besse 1935-2023, age 88 Builder inductee: Hockey, softball

Bud Besse was on the ice as a referee in 1963 when the Saskatoon Quakers senior team played an exhibition game at the Arena against the Trail Smoke Eaters, Canada's representative for the upcoming world hockey championship in Stockholm.

Besse was in the dugout as coach in 1970 when the StarPhoenix team won the Saskatchewan commercial fastball title.

Besse was the chair of POW City Kinsmen's second annual Skate-A-Rama in 1971 when players in the C and D Divisions in the Saskatoon Hockey Association skated around the quarter-mile oval in ***Gordie Howe** Park in a fundraising event.

For more than 30 years, Besse was an umpire and coach in softball and a ref in junior, senior, university and semi-pro hockey. He was a man of vision in minor hockey.

"To make playing minor hockey an enjoyable experience for the boys through the whole system, the main thing I wanted for the boys was to learn how to skate," he said.

"I encourage parents to become involved."

Natasha (Kramble) Fox 1990-2023, age 33 Wrestling

Graduation day for Natasha Kramble was March 3, 2006. A Grade 10 student in Walter Murray Collegiate, she won the 48 kg title in the Saskatoon high school wrestling championships that day. She had finished third a year before.

Kramble went on to win the Saskatchewan high school title in Grade 10. She won city and provincial titles again in Grade 11. She added a third city title in Grade 12 and won every bout by pin at provincials.

With the University of Saskatchewan Huskies, she won the Canada West conference title in 2011 and was third three times in the Canadian university championships. She won the national U SPORTS community service award for female wrestlers. She received the **Val Girsberger** Award in Huskie Athletics for all-around female student-athletes.

Kramble won the Canadian juvenile title when she was 18 and the Canadian senior twice, at age 26 and 28. As a member of the national team, she was second in the 2013 Pan American championships in Panama City, second in the Pan American championships in Frisco, Texas, fourth in the 2013 World University Games in Kazan, Russia, 25th in the 2013 world championships in Budapest, Hungary and 12th in the 2021 world championships in Oslo, Norway.

Kramble was coached in high school by ***Gil Wist**, in university and club by **Todd Hinds** and **Shane Bradley** and on the national team by **Leigh Verling**.

Earning degrees in Education and Kinesiology with great distinction, she was a school teacher and a wrestling coach.

Arnold Kroll 1934-2023, age 89 Athletics

Dr. Lowell Loewen 1934-2023, age 88 Athletics

Arnold Kroll and Dr. Lowell Loewen stayed in the background in track and field, promoting not themselves but the sport, keeping athletes in the fore.

Arnold and his wife Jackie camped out at Griffiths Stadium. When they weren't standing close to the track, watching daughter ***Lisa Kroll** break city and provincial records as a sprinter, they were working the concession stand for the Saskatoon Track & Field Club in the nearby clubhouse.

Arnold Kroll was co-chair of the Knights of Columbus Saskatchewan Indoor Games. He was president of the ***Bob Adams** Foundation that supports and honors athletes, coaches and officials.

Loewen was a pole vault official in the Commonwealth Games and the World University Games. He served on the board of the Canadian Centre for Drug Free Sport and was the co-ordinator of drug testing for the 1989 Canada Summer Games in Saskatoon.

Loewen's son **Michael Loewen** competed in athletics in sprints, high jump and long jump.

Ron Wallace 1939-2023, age 83 Builder inductee: Hockey

Ron Wallace had a hand in the Saskatoon Minor Hockey Association's first season in 1955-56. He played for the Mayfair juveniles, who won the city title and were defeated in the provincial final by the Regina Pats.

His presence in hockey continued for years. Wallace served on the board with the Saskatoon Minor Hockey Association, the Saskatchewan Amateur Hockey Association and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

He coached hockey, including Walter Murray's team with centre ***Dave King** that in 1965 won the annual Saskatoon invitational junior tournament for teams from Western Canada.

He was an assistant coach and manager on the Saskatchewan midget team that included athletes **Bob Faulkner**, ***Orest Kindrachuk**, **Don Kozak**, **Lawrence Sacharuk** and **Mick Shaw** and finished third in Canadian Centennial hockey tournament in Kingston, ON., in 1967.

Wallace was a player/coach in the Northern Saskatchewan Baseball League throughout the 1960s with the Saskatoon Commodores, managed by ***Spero Lealos**.

Ron coached the Eastview Braves, who won the provincial mosquito baseball championship for players age 9-10 in 1982. His son **Lane Wallace** was on the team.

A teacher at Walter Murray Collegiate for 30 years, Ron was an assistant coach on Murray's football team in 1978 when his son **Alan Wallace** scored two touchdowns on receptions in the city high school semifinal.

Back in the 1950s, when Ron was a student at Bedford Road Collegiate, he played for Bedford's basketball and football teams. He played end for one season on the University of Saskatchewan Huskies football team.

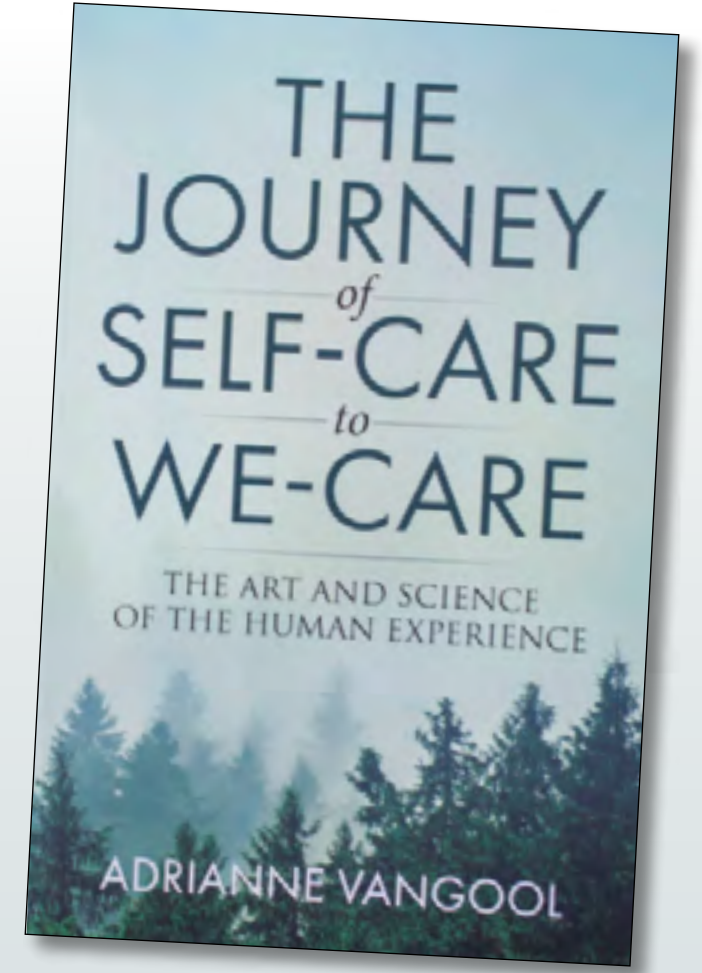
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Anholt looking forward

Hockey Canada has named ***Peter Anholt** as general manager of the national under-20 men's team for the 2024 world championship in Goteborg, Sweden. Anholt is GM of the WHL's Lethbridge Hurricanes . . . ***Randy Smith** is now the senior advisor with the Delisle Chiefs in the Prairie Junior Hockey League . . . Sisters **Dayna King** and **Danene Kopperud** will be inducted into the Ted Knight Saskatchewan Hockey Hall of Fame at its ceremony this fall in their hometown of Meadow Lake. Dayna and Danene played for the University of Saskatchewan Huskies, Danene from 2003-04 to 2006-07 and Dayna from 2006-07 to 2007-08. They are being inducted in the builder/grassroots class with their brothers **D.J. King** and **Dwight King**, who both played in the NHL . . . ***Trevor Ethier** is returning as a coach with the Canadian junior women's softball team in 2023. Ethier has been with the national team program since 2017 . . . ***Ken Achs** was awarded a Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal by the province of Saskatchewan for achievements, contributions and service . . . ***Eugene Hritzuk's** curling know-how is being drawn upon by **Sean Maw**, an associate professor in the College of Engineering at the University of Saskatchewan. Starting in the spring of 2023 and continuing for 18 months, Hritzuk and Maw are studying how sweeping affects rocks . . . Two big time curlers from Alberta who competed in Saskatoon died this spring. **Matt Baldwin** was 96, **Ron Northcott** 86. Baldwin was the skip on Alberta rinks that won the Brier in 1954, 1957 and 1958. A native of Blucher, he is an alumnus of Nutana Collegiate. Baldwin played in the first Western Canada university championship in 1947 when he was a mechanical engineering student at the University of Saskatchewan. He also competed in the Saskatoon bonspiel during the 1950s. Northcott was the skip on Alberta rinks that won the Brier in 1966, 1968 and 1969. He played on the rink from Vulcan, AB., that finished fourth in the Canadian school boy curling championship, held in the Arena in Saskatoon in 1953 . . . ***Michael Linklater** is one of the feature speakers on a panel that will talk about Indigenous athletes and builders of sport at the second annual National Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21. The event, presented by Canada's Sports Hall of Fame, is at the Calgary Public Library and on livestream . . . **Dr. Megan Dash** is now the Chief Medical Officer with Canadian Sports Centre Saskatchewan. Dash

"Simple daily tools can help us move into a place of healing and ease," Vangool said.

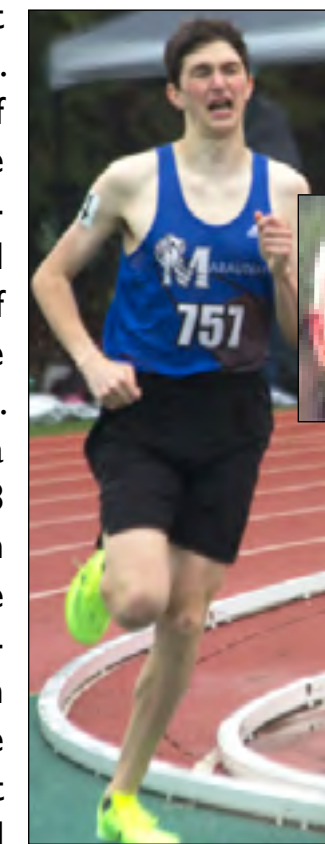

The induction dinner is Saturday, Sept. 23 in the Conexus Arts Centre in Regina.

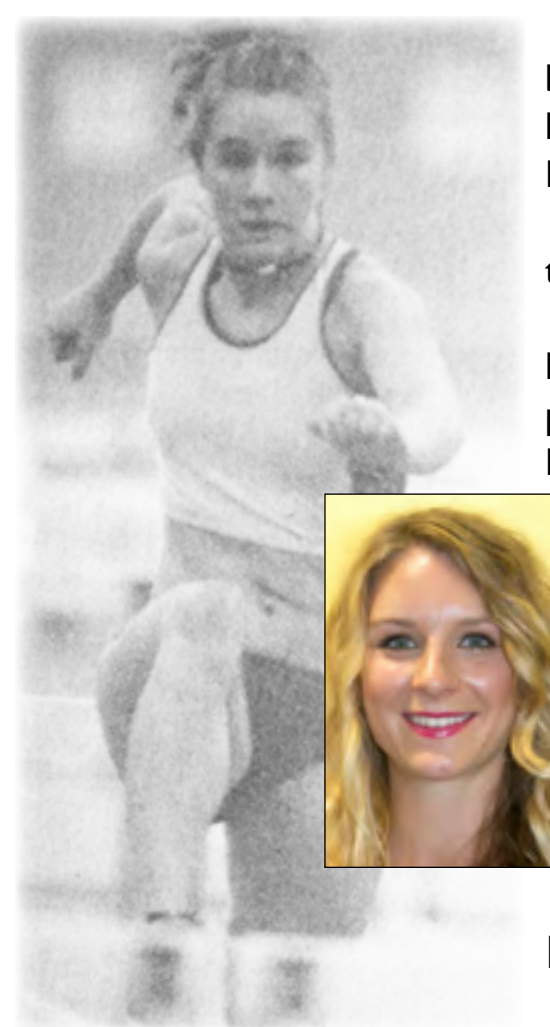

Besides the provincial Hall, Saskatchewan has satellite Sports Halls of Fame in Humboldt, Moose Jaw,

North Battleford, Prince Albert, Regina, Saskatoon, and Yorkton.

The Saskatchewan Golf Hall of Fame is in Saskatoon, the Saskatchewan Baseball Hall of Fame is in Battleford, the Ted Knight Saskatchewan Hockey Hall of Fame is in Swift Current and the Tanner Curling Museum is in Weyburn.

Little 500 cycling race at the University of Saskatchewan in the fall of 1958 draws crowd of 1,200 to Griffiths Stadium; winning Arts & Science team includes big wheels in sports

The Arts & Science team of George Armitage, Ian Baker, Dave Canning, Lyle Davis, Larry Gnyp, Hans Koenig, Alex Lypka and Rudy Neufeld did 200 laps of the track at Griffiths Stadium. Averaging 19 miles per hour (30.5 km-h) for 50 miles, they finished in two hours, 34 minutes, 19 seconds, breaking the record for the annual race that was first held in 1956.

One of the passengers in the pace car was Jane Wentz, an arts student who was on the University of Saskatchewan's swim team. Wentz married engineering student and Huskies football quarterback Ron Graham. The Grahams are prominent donors to Huskie Athletics and the U of S.

Koenig raced to the lead on the opening lap of the race in 1958 and the Arts & Science team was never caught, winning the Egg Beater Trophy ahead of 15 other teams from colleges on campus.

● George Armitage

Armitage, a runner coached by ***Bob Adams** in the Saskatoon Nutana Kiwanis Track & Field Club, was selected to Saskatchewan's team for the annual Canadian Legion national meet in Toronto.

Armitage finished third in the University of Saskatchewan's intramural cross-country race in 1959 when he was in the College of Medicine.

● Ian Baker

Baker was on the Huskies hockey team coached by ***Don Burgess** for three years, becoming team captain, team MVP and a conference all-star on left wing.

After moving to Edmonton, he was a right winger on the University of Alberta hockey team for two seasons. Baker scored two goals in the final when the Golden Bears won their first Canadian university hockey title in 1964.

● Dave Canning

Canning was on the Arts & Science team that won the intramural volleyball title and also played for the Huskies in Western Canadian university volleyball.

● Lyle Davis

Davis finished second as a Huskie in the Western Canadian university cross-country running championships in 1957.

● Hans Koenig

Koenig was a sports whiz.

In track & field, he won the 440-yard race, finished second in the 220 race and high jump and was third in broad jump in the Saskatchewan Open. He was first in shot put at the Alberta Open.

He played on the Arts & Science team that won the intramural soccer championship.

He directed the University of Saskatchewan gym club that trained twice a week in the Upper Gym on campus.

He played for the Huskies volleyball team coached by

***Ches Anderson.**

In the 1980s, Koenig coached high school badminton at Evan Hardy Collegiate. His daughter **Jane Koenig** won the provincial high school girls singles title in badminton in 1984.

Jane played one season for the University of Saskatchewan Huskiettes volleyball team.

● Alex Lypka

Lypka played senior ball in the Southern Baseball League for the Balcarres Braves and Fort Qu'Appelle Sioux Indians. He was regarded as one of the top defensive outfielders in the league.

Alex's daughters **Tanya Lypka** and **Nadia Lypka** were on the University of Saskatchewan track and field team in 1990s. Son **Michael Lypka** was on Huskies teams in two sports, soccer and track & field.

Tanya was a gold medallist in the 100-metre hurdles in the 1993 Canada Games. She won the Canada West university title in the 60-metre hurdles in 1994, setting the conference record.

● Rudy Neufeld

Neufeld played for the University of Saskatchewan tennis team coached by ***John Leicester.**

He was on the Huskies volleyball team for three years, reaching the Western university final in 1961.

He won the Canadian senior men's volleyball championship with Toronto Balmy Beach in 1967.

Neufeld is the first athlete from Saskatchewan, male or female, to make the Canadian national volleyball team. He competed in the 1967 Pan-American Games in Winnipeg and the 1969 North America, Central America and Caribbean championship in Mexico City.

***Diane Hanysh** and **Fay Varty** score in the last minute as Bedford Road wins its first high school provincial title in a team sport, defeating Regina Sacred Heart 30-25 in the girls basketball final in 1958 at the Education Gym in Saskatoon.

Hanysh, who is in Grade 11, was also in the final with Bedford the previous two years. Bedford's coach is ***Dot George.**

Eight months later in 1958, Bedford makes it a double at provincials. Bedford Road defeats Regina Champion College 28-13 in the Saskatchewan high school football final at Griffiths Stadium.

Although Champion uses a defensive alignment with five linemen and four linebackers to try to contain the run, Bedford's ***Dale West** and ***George Short**, who are ranked No. 1 and 2 in Canada in juvenile sprinting, run for 386 yards and three touchdowns.
